3. The memorial to Thomas Jefferson includes various quotes that he is known for. On the southeast wall, the quote states:

"I am not an advocate for frequent changes in laws and constitutions. But laws and institutions must go hand in hand with the progress of the human mind. As that becomes more developed, more enlightened, as new discoveries are made, new truths discovered and manners and opinions change with the change of circumstances, institutions must advance also to keep pace with the times..."

Yet, he also owned and profited off the numerous slaves who worked at his Monticello estate in Virginia.
